

MINUTES FOR REGULAR MEETING OF NESQUEHONING BOROUGH COUNCIL

ROLL CALL: COUNCILMEN DiMICELI, HAWK, JACOBS, SNISCAK JR., STROMELO;

President DeMarco called the meeting to order at 7:01 p.m.

MINUTES: Regular Meeting held on December 19, 2007 and the Reorganizational Meeting on
January 07, 2008

Councilman DiMiceli moved and Councilman Sniscak, Jr. seconded to approve the December 19,
2007 Regular Meeting Minutes and January 7, 2008 Reorganizational Meeting Minutes.

Councilman Hawk stated that there was a name correction, Ed Bielarski, in the Panther Creek Report.

All voted yes. Motion passed

HEARING OF VISITORS

Patricia Black, 201 West Mill Street, stated that they have been evacuated from their home five times because of the neighbor's furnace. She stated how Carl Royer owns the house but John Gambino was living in and leasing the house. She stated that they could not put up with this anymore because her husband was a heart patient and she was a cancer patient. Mrs. Black stated how Mr. Gambino was cited for the incident on Sunday but Mr. Royer owns the house not Mr. Gambino. Mrs. Black stated that in 2004 Mr. Royer was told to get the furnace fixed or install a new furnace. She stated how Eddie Watkins keeps saying how there was nothing wrong with the furnace. She stated that there has to be something wrong with it if they have been evicted five times. Councilman DiMiceli stated that when it comes time to be re-inspected by their building inspector, who should be there to sign off on it. Solicitor Yurchak stated that they always make the owner of the house responsible. Mrs. Black stated that the owner of the house was Carl and Theresa Royer, which was on the deed at the Courthouse.

Councilman DiMiceli stated how the house was posted on Sunday. He stated that Mr. Gambino signed off of it and he knows that he cannot go back into the house. Councilman DiMiceli stated that he had talked to the plumber and the system was drained so it would appear that he would not be going back in for a while. Councilman DiMiceli asked in the event that Mr. Gambino does go back into the house, how would they handle it? Solicitor Yurchak stated that it had to be inspected.

Chief Smith stated what they did before was that the plumber would meet him at the house and once the plumber checked and certified everything, the plumber would sign off on the form. Councilman DiMiceli stated how according to the ordinance, the building inspector checks it also. Mrs. Black stated how Mr. Watkins keeps saying how there was nothing wrong with the furnace. President DeMarco stated how it was not just up to Mr. Watkins. He stated how the building inspector has to go and give his approval. President DeMarco stated how they will both (plumber and inspector) be liable and it would be their credibility if it would happen again. Mrs. Black stated that if it happened again, they might have four dead people. President DeMarco stated that they did not want that to happen. Councilman DiMiceli stated that he understood how there was not enough coal over the worm. He stated how that was why they were getting the sulfur odor back into the house.

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Councilman DiMiceli asked if there was anything they could be cited for under a nuisance ordinance. He stated how they might have to go under the crime code for recklessly endangering someone. Solicitor Yurchak stated that he would have to check.

President DeMarco asked John McArdle for a recommendation. John McArdle stated how they have people moving into town, who have no idea how a coal furnace works. He stated that Mr. Gambino told him when he arrived that he shut the furnace off at 3:00 p.m. He stated that when they arrived right before midnight, the boiler temperature was 180 degrees and it was almost zero outside. Mr. McArdle stated that the coal was taken out of the furnace and fresh coal was put in to make it appear that there was no fire in the furnace. He stated how he could tell that there was fire but there was no coal in the worm. Mr. McArdle stated how they have the same problem with another half of double. He stated how they were taking bags of coal into the house. He stated how it was a sulfur smell, which backs up through the house, not a high CO reading. Councilman Jacobs asked about the reading the other night. Mr. McArdle stated that they did not have a CO reading but they did have a high combustible sulfur reading. He stated how it can cause the same kind of problems and how it was like a mine gas. Councilman Jacobs stated that anyone who has worked a coal furnace knows how the sulfur smell can back up through the house. Mr. McArdle stated that everything was taken out of the house and Mr. Gambino gave a forwarding address of Beaver Meadows. Mrs. Black stated how the Water Authority had turned off the water.

Mrs. Black stated that before anybody goes back into the house, she wanted the water pipes taken out of her cellar. She stated how the water pipes go through her cellar. Mrs. Black stated that she wanted something done immediately. President DeMarco stated that since the water was shut off by the Water Authority, before someone decides to move in there and have the water turned on; they will have the building inspector go in and inspect it. Mrs. Black asked who was going to be the inspector and who was going to pay for it. President DeMarco stated how the Borough has a building inspector and the home owner would pay for it. President DeMarco stated how nothing would happen now since it was empty. He stated how the water authority would have to be notified to not turn the water on until the inspector comes in and inspects the boiler.

Councilman DiMiceli asked Solicitor Yurchak to draft a letter to Carl Royer, since he was the property owner telling him what has to be done before anybody can go back in the house. Mr. McArdle stated how he needed to keep the coal hopper filled, which was an ongoing problem. President DeMarco stated how if it happened again, the owner was going to be fined. Councilman DiMiceli stated about what he had mentioned earlier that if they knowingly put someone in danger by not having coal on the worm, it would go under the crimes code for recklessly endangering another person by a careless act. President DeMarco stated how they would go after the homeowner because it was not only the tenant's responsibility but also the homeowners.

Mrs. Black stated that Mr. Watkins kept saying how there was nothing wrong with the furnace. Councilman DiMiceli stated that it was really not the furnace. He stated how it was the fact that there was no coal over the worm and the air was coming back in. Mrs. Black stated how they were getting all the fumes. Councilman DiMiceli stated that as far as the plumber goes, he was accurate saying that there was nothing wrong with the furnace; it was the person who was running it. President DeMarco stated how Solicitor Yurchak will send a letter and they will track it from there.

A few more comments were made in regards to the furnace, the water and the ordinance.

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POLICE REPORT

Chief Smith gave the Police Report for December as follows:

\$320.12 fine money received from Magistrate Kosciolk; \$85.71 received in Carbon County Collections; \$250 received in parking tickets; \$195.00 received in moving permits; \$30.00 received in accident reports; 321 total complaints received; 40 citations (9 non-traffic & 31 traffic); 10 criminal arrests; 12 traffic accidents (9 reportable & 3 non-reportable); 9 court appearances and the mileage total was 4,995 (1,333 – 2000 Crown Vic; 919 – 2008 Chevy Impala; 2,215 - 2003 Crown Vic; 528 - 2005 Expedition).

HOUSING & CODE ENFORCEMENT OFFICER'S REPORT

Chief Smith stated that Council has his and Officer Blisard's code reports. Chief Smith asked if he could send Officer Wuttke to an Advanced Crime Scene Processing class for one day on Wednesday, February 13, 2008 for 6 hours. He stated that the class was free, however, it was Officer Wuttke's day off and he would be receiving overtime.

Councilman Sniscak, Jr. moved and Councilman DiMiceli seconded to approve sending Officer Wuttke to the Advanced Crime Scene Processing class. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman DiMiceli moved and Councilman Jacobs seconded to tentatively approve the handicap parking signs for Angela Zovak-Campbell (W. Center Street) and Harold Sugarman (E. Center Street) subject to Mayor Walck review. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman Stromelo moved and Councilwoman Walck seconded to approve the handicap parking sign for Tammy Buccilli (W. High Street). All voted yes. Motion passed.

President DeMarco asked Secretary/Treasurer Ahner to check with the Nesquehoning Savings Bank on rates for the General Sewer CD dated for February 28, 2008.

All voted yes. Motion passed.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT REPORT

John McArdle stated how they had a little activity in town. He stated that on Locust Street they had an incident with odor of propane, which was a truck parked with residual waste. He stated that Councilman DiMiceli got involved the following day because the truck was still parked there and they had to contact the trucking company to get the vehicle moved.

Mr. McArdle stated that the other incident was with the coal sludge up at the Wash Shanty, which was being addressed with DEP. He stated that the contractors have to power broom the highway and it was going to be monitored. He stated how it had caused a couple of accidents because it produced an oily residue on the service and when the temperature dropped they had to get PennDOT in to sand the area down.

Mr. McArdle stated how he was in the process of completing the NIMS 300 class. He stated how he distributed a packet that contained a NIMS Matrix, which he was requesting Council President to sign. He stated how he had listed on there the amount of people who were qualified so far in the 100, 200, 300, and 700.

Councilman Jacobs moved and Councilman Stromelo seconded to approve all communications and accept the application and place them on file. All voted yes. Motion passed.

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COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. STREETS

**MARK STROMELO, CHAIRMAN; DON DeMARCO, CO-CHAIRMAN;
MICHAEL SNISCAK, JR**

Councilman Stromelo stated about the letter pertaining to the salt contract, which had to be acted on before March 15, 2008. He stated how the contract would be for 2008 – 2009. He stated about having Secretary/Treasurer Ahner fill out the appropriate paperwork. Secretary/Treasurer Ahner stated how she will need to know what kind of tonnage they were looking at again this year. She stated how she had given them a sample of what was submitted last year.

Councilman Stromelo moved and Councilman Jacobs seconded to get the paperwork in for the Salt Bids. All voted yes. Motion passed.

President DeMarco stated about the Committee setting a date to meet sometime in February. The Street Committee scheduled a meeting at the Borough Garage for 4:30 p.m. on Monday, February 4, 2008.

2. SEWER

**DAVID HAWK, CHAIRMAN; FRANK JACOBS, CO-CHAIRMAN;

Councilman DiMiceli moved and Councilman Sniscak, Jr. seconded to waive the late fee of \$21.00 for Heritage Sign & Display this one time. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman Jacobs stated how he talked to David Digilio and the new employee was working out well down at the Sewer Plant.

3. BUILDINGS

Councilman Jacobs stated how he will have to get a plumber in because there was a small pipe leaking on the furnace in the basement.

4. POLICE

PUBLIC SAFETY

**MICHAEL SNISCAK, JR, CHAIRMAN; FRANK DiMICELI, CO-
CHAIRMAN; DAVID HAWK**

Councilman Sniscak, Jr. stated about a memorandum that was given to Council from the Mayor. He stated how the Committee met with the Mayor and the Chief and resolved the problem that the memo presented but he would like Solicitor Yurchak to give a definite answer on the memo because the committee did not agree with it. Solicitor Yurchak stated that the Council Members would have to address it internally. Councilman Sniscak, Jr. stated how they did address it and the Mayor had asked that the memo be rescinded.

Councilman Sniscak, Jr. stated how he received a memorandum from Chief Smith. He stated how the Chief was requesting that the Police and Public Safety Committee meet to start negotiations on his contract. Councilman Sniscak, Jr. stated how he would like to set up a meeting and they should pick a time because they were already short an officer. He stated that the Chief, the Mayor and the Public and

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Public Safety Committee Members will meet to go over the requests and then submit them to all of Council. Councilman DiMiceli stated how they would work out the time with the Chief. He stated that the one thing that they were going to do was define the Chief's duties.

5. SANITATION MARK STROMELO, CHAIRMAN; DAVID HAWK, CO-CHAIRMAN; FRANK DiMICELI

Councilman Stromelo stated how the employee who was terminated filed a grievance. Solicitor Yurchak stated how he would take care of it and get in touch with Robbie Best.

6. RECREATION DAVID HAWK, CHAIRMAN; MARK STROMELO, CO-CHAIRMAN; ROSE WALCK

Councilman Hawk stated that the Recreation Commission had a meeting the night before and the purpose for the meeting came from the Borough auditor. He stated how in the past the Recreation Commission's finances have been included in the Borough's Financial Statements. He stated how the auditor's recommendation was, due to some new changes and new criteria in auditing, that the Recreation Commission's Financial Reports be separate from the Borough's Financial Reports. Councilman Hawk stated how they have their own accounts but were included in the Borough's audit statements.

President DeMarco asked who was going to do their audit. Councilman Hawk stated that with being a not-for-profit, they have a little more flexibility than the Borough. He stated that they could do an internal audit based on forming an audit committee of their own members or they could hire somebody. Councilman Hawk stated that they were looking into contacting a CPA, which would be cheaper than what the Borough's Auditor would charge. President DeMarco stated that he did trust them but they should not do their own audit. Councilman Stromelo stated how they were looking at Norman Richards. He stated how Julian had recommended him. He stated how he had talked to Julian and then talked to Councilman Hawk. Councilman Stromelo stated how Julian recommended making it retroactive effective January 1, 2007 so that it was not included in that years audit.

Councilman Jacobs asked Solicitor Yurchak that the Borough Code stated how any agency that the Borough subsidizes must be included in the yearly audit. Solicitor Yurchak stated that he would have to check. Secretary/Treasurer Ahner stated that because the Borough does not sign the checks they have no knowledge of the cash flow. She stated how they were a separate entity with there own EIN number kind of like the Nesquehoning Water Authority. Secretary/Treasurer Ahner stated how all Council does was to appoint the Commission Members and the Recreation Commission runs their own business. Councilman Hawk stated how they do pay a lot of the bills but they do not give the Commission any money.

Councilman DiMiceli stated that anybody who was handling money should be bonded. He asked if they were bonded and stated that if they were not bonded that maybe they could get bonded. President DeMarco asked if they were bonded or if it fell under the Borough. Councilman Stromelo stated that he thought that they were bonded. Councilman Jacobs stated how they had some problem years ago when the fund was drained. Councilman DiMiceli stated how if it did happen the Commission could get some of their money back. Councilman Hawk stated how he felt that it was in the Borough's best interest to go in that direction.

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Councilman Hawk moved and Councilman DiMiceli seconded to separate the Recreation Commission's financial statements from the Borough's financial statements retroactive back to January 1, 2007.

Councilman Jacobs asked if the Commission would produce to Council a copy of their audit when it was completed because they should have something on file. Councilman Hawk stated "yes". Councilman Stromelo stated how they will still get the reports that were provided already. Larry Fox asked if they were having their own books audited, who would be paying for that audit. President DeMarco stated how it would be the Commission's responsibility.

All voted yes with the exception of Councilman Stromelo who was not voting. Motion passed.

7. BUDGET DAVID HAWK, CHAIRMAN; FRANK JACOBS, CO-CHAIRMAN; DON DeMARCO

➤ 01.17.08 Julian Kirk – questions on budgeted line items

Councilman Hawk mentioned how they received a letter from the auditor asking for information on four line items, which came in over budget for 2007. He asked Secretary/Treasurer Ahner if she responded yet or not. Secretary/Treasurer Ahner stated how she did try to explain some of them. She stated how the police ended up being over because of the police car and the fire was over because of the fire truck.
