ROLL CALL: COUNCILMEN DeMARCO, HAWK, STROMELO; COUNCILWOMAN WALCK; PRESIDENT JACOBS; MAYOR WALCK; SOLICITOR YURCHAK; & CHIEF SMITH

President Jacobs called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m.
Councilmen DiMiceli and Digiglio were both absent.

MINUTES: Regular Meeting held on April 25, 2007
Councilman DeMarco moved and Councilwoman Walck seconded to approve the April 25, 2007 Regular Meeting Minutes. All voted yes. Motion passed

HEARING OF VISITORS

President Jacobs stated that they will be going into an executive session for personnel reasons immediately after the police report.

No hearing of visitors.

POLICE REPORT

Chief Smith stated that there was \$1,701.04 of fine money collected in April. He stated that there were 297 complaints received, 22 court appearances, and 4,795 patrol miles. Chief Smith stated that they all had a copy of the report. He stated that they also had a copy of Officer Blisard's Code report and his packet, which was his code report.

Councilman DeMarco moved and Councilman Hawk seconded to accept the Police Report and the Code Enforcement Officer's Report. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Borough Council entered into an Executive Session at 7:04 p.m. The Council Members exited their Executive Session at 7:22 p.m.

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President Jacobs stated how they met with the Railroad and the Commissioners concerning the Hauto Bypass. President Jacobs stated that the third letter down was in regards to Coal Street, where it blew out. He stated that this was a letter that Ron Tirpak sent to Jean Saylor. President Jacobs stated that the Railroad was looking for the Borough to get permits in order to do the work. He stated that they were looking at a cost of \$10,000 - \$15,000 in fees to work along the Railroad. President Jacobs stated that they were telling them that it was on their property and the Borough was willing to fix the culvert but they want the Railroad to waive the fees. He stated that there was a \$500.00 application fee. President Jacobs stated that all of the stipulation that Mr. Tirpak wants to waive was listed in the letter. He stated that it would not be an added cost from what they got from PEMA/FEMA to do the project. President Jacobs stated that they want the Railroad to waive the fees. Larry Fox asked if they were talking about the hole. He asked if they could not put some kind of fence around it. President Jacobs stated how that was what they were hoping was going to happen from that letter, because they did not have the extra money. He stated that they did get some money from PEMA/FEMA.

Mayor Walck stated how at the meeting he had mentioned it to the gentlemen from the Railroad and from the County that it was not the Borough's liability. He stated how he had made mention that they should secure the hole. Mr. Fox asked about the other hole. President Jacobs stated how that was going to be taken care of. He stated how they had received money from PEMA/FEMA for that one also.

Councilman DeMarco moved and Councilman Hawk seconded to accept all the reports to this point. All voted yes. Motion passed.

SOLICITOR'S REPORT

➤ Nesquehoning Housing & Structure Code

Solicitor Yurchak stated how all of Council had a copy to review. He asked if Council would like to advertise it, hold it for another month or had anything to change on it. President Jacobs stated that they would review it.

Solicitor Yurchak stated that he had a draft of a large vehicle parking ordinance. He stated that it would restrict parking of large vehicles in certain areas within the Borough. He stated that he did not designate the areas. He stated how he thought that Council should do that.

Solicitor Yurchak stated that the citation has been filed with the District Judge in Lansford in regards to the Pigs on Rhume Street. He stated that there was no appeal made to the Zoning Hearing Board.

Solicitor Yurchak stated that DEP had asked him to go over and look at the fly ash. He stated how he had brought back a copy of the application and a map of where they were doing all of their digging. He stated that Keystone Anthracite Marketing Corporation was doing the work in that area. He stated that they were doing some surface coal removal in one section and how the fly ash that was being dumped up there was coming from the Panther Creek CoGen. He stated that they were mixing the dirt with the CoGen. He stated that it was in the Little Italy Ash disposal site. Councilman DeMarco stated that if they would read that, which was very well defined as to what they were going to do. He stated that they had only ever received the application and never knew what was going on.

Councilman DeMarco stated how it explained everything that they wanted to do along with the tonnage. Solicitor Yurchak stated how it even stated that there was no public water within 1,000 feet of where they were working.

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Solicitor Yurchak stated about the meeting that they had concerning the Route 54 Bypass. He stated that they needed to address two different motions. Solicitor Yurchak stated how they were asked by PennDOT to pass a motion to authorize them to file an application with the PUC on the Borough's behalf to convert the three Railroad crossings from private to public. President Jacobs stated that it would be at no cost to the Borough. Solicitor Yurchak stated that if it would fall through, PennDOT would pull the application. President Jacobs stated that if some reason the Bypass would not get funded then nothing would take place. Mayor Walck stated that grant money cannot go through with private Railroad crossings. He stated that it would have to be turned over to public. Mayor Walck stated that the Railroad will maintain it up to five feet of the railroad crossing. President Jacobs stated that the Railroad would be responsible for the gates and any maintenance on it.

Councilman Hawk moved and Councilman Stromelo seconded to authorize PennDOT to file an application with the PUC on the Borough's behalf. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Solicitor Yurchak stated that they also have to do a shared use agreement with the County and the Railroad for the crossings because the County owns the ground and the Railroad leases the ground and the Borough will be maintaining the public right-of-way. He stated how PennDOT would like them to do a shared use agreement and the motion would be to authorize him to work on it with the County and the Railroad.

Councilwoman Walck moved and Councilman DeMarco to authorize Solicitor Yurchak to work with the County and the Railroad on a shared use agreement. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman DeMarco moved and Councilwoman Walck seconded to accept the Solicitor's Report. All voted yes. Motion passed.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

1. STREETS

**MARK STROMELO, CHAIRMAN; SAL DIGIGLIO CO-CHAIRMAN;
DON DeMARCO**

President Jacobs stated about a question that was raised concerning people getting access on Tippetts Road. He stated how he was up there with Ron Tirpak the day they had the preconstruction meeting on Railroad Street. He stated how Mr. Tirpak looked over the bridge going over to Tippetts Road. President Jacobs stated that Mr. Tirpak recommended that they remove the 6 ton weight limit on the bridge because the bridge could take far in excess of 6 ton. He stated that they got the right-of-way for Lake Hauto Residents and their guests from the court. He stated that they could not get any fuel oil, coal or anything else into those homes. He stated that they were taking their garbage over to the south side of the Railroad tracks. President Jacobs stated that Mr. Tirpak went back to his office and looked over the construction plans from when it was put in. Councilman DeMarco stated that it was their bridge so they could put the exclusion in there that Emergency Vehicles and their Sanitation crew could use the bridge. President Jacobs stated that when Mr. Tout was there at the last meeting, he read what the award from the court was. Councilman Stromelo stated that they have since received a letter from Mr. Kuchta and his wife allowing them to use his side of the road. He stated that it would be local deliveries and no through traffic. Councilman Hawk stated that about local deliveries to the three residents not to any others at the Lake. He stated about local deliveries to the three homes, school buses, Emergency vehicles, and their Sanitation truck. Councilman Stromelo stated how the prior Council put the weight limit on the bridge when they were doing the dam.

Councilman DeMarco moved and Councilman Stromelo seconded to remove the 6 ton weight limit and restrict the bridge to local deliveries to the three residents, Emergency Vehicles, School Buses, and the Nesquehoning Sanitation Truck.

Mickey Angst asked about the commitments that the Borough made on that road because it was damaged by a flood. He stated that they received Federal money to correct it. He stated that the Borough had to pledge to keep it open and maintain it. Solicitor Yurchak stated that it was only up to a point. He stated that they were only talking about the weight limits. President Jacobs stated that they were only talking about the bridge.

All voted yes. Motion passed.

President Jacobs stated about sending letters to the Lake Hauto Club, the three Fire Companies, the three residents on Tippetts Road, the Panther Valley School Board and Lansford/Coaldale Water Authority.

Councilman Stromelo stated that there was a paving project coming up on East Railroad Street, from Hazard Street to Pine Street. He stated that they were installing some storm drains now.

Councilman Stromelo stated that the street sweeping will continue next week. He stated that they will finish up New Columbus/Little Flower and in Nesquehoning. He stated that they were going to try and clean up around the monument, the VFW and the cemetery for the parade. Councilman Stromelo stated that it was the same thing with line painting. Councilman Stromelo stated that to complete the macadam with the storm drains, they had talked about getting a roller or a vibrating pan.

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Councilman Stromelo moved and Councilman DeMarco seconded to purchase a roller or taper through the state program not to exceed \$2,000.00.

Mr. Mermon asked if the residents on Railroad Street were notified about changing the water lines. President Jacobs stated how he thought that they had changed around six of them.

All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman DeMarco asked if they were going to hire that kid again this year. He stated that nobody had called him yet. President Jacobs stated that he had tried to call E.J. last week. He stated that his sister answered and he told her to have him call. Mr. Fox stated how he had called him and told him that nobody notified him. President Jacobs stated how they had talked about how much time he was going to put in because last year he left right away for football practice. Councilman Stromelo stated that the school gets out in June. He stated that they wanted an idea from him as to how long he was going to be able to work. President Jacobs stated that he will try to get in touch with him again.

2. SEWER DAVID HAWK, CHAIRMAN; FRANK JACOBS, CO-CHAIRMAN; FRANK DiMICELI

Councilman DeMarco moved and Councilwoman Walck seconded to hire Kathy Burns as temporary cleaning person for Grace Whildin while she was out with knee surgery. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman Hawk moved and Councilman Stromelo seconded to give Chief Sean Smith a raise from \$20.63 to \$21.37 per hour, which was an increase of 3.6%, which was in line with what the full-time officers received, retroactive to January 1, 2007. All voted yes. Motion passed.

Councilman Stromelo asked what was up with the Bott property. Solicitor Yurchak stated how he had spoken to Mr. Bott, who intends to tear it down and put up an office building. He stated that he had received a call that day from Mauch Chunk Trust, who wanted to know what kind of deposit was required to tear it down. He stated that he told them to get an estimate and let him know.

President Jacobs stated that they will be coming in on Friday, June 1, 2007 to repave the two blocks on Railroad Street. He stated that they were supposed to come in on Tuesday, May 29, 2007.

President Jacobs stated that the November meeting, due to the meeting being scheduled for the day before Thanksgiving, will be changed to Monday, November 19, 2007.
